Collaboration is Key

It is so refreshing to witness the ripples of collaboration starting to spread across the landscape of conservation.

Some years ago I retired from the highly driven construction industry, only to walk into the unexpectedly competitive arena of conservation. I made nurturing co-operation across all spectrums a new personal goal. Now ZCA have stepped into the frame and are taking this to scale. Wonderful. A case study in motion is the ZCA strengthening the conversation across the Middle Zambezi, uniting three countries and helping build a trans-boundary ethos while the bureaucratic processes grind on.

In addition to the stated objectives, I believe ZCA is in pursuit of a shared, over-arching vision. I hope this will lead us into a new territory of engagement. The platforms and networks to enable robust and respectful discussion. There are very, very few generic solutions across Africa or even within one country. Individual wild landscapes have their unique challenges which spill over into communities and into the dynamics of the host nation. A solution in one area may in fact be the cause for demise of a habitat in another.

I also hope that through a new way of engaging with each other we will find the need to prescribe and preach less, and rather listen more. Creative, pioneering ideas are borne out of wide and deep listening.

In closing I commend ZCA in their quest to provide insurance cover for over 3,000 rangers. Every ranger has a family. Every ranger has a story. Let's listen and share these.

WHAT WE'VE BEEN UP TO

It has been a tumultuous start to 2021 for the world. The steady global roll out of the vaccine hopefully bodes well for the resumption of business in every sector.Zimbabwe sprang into action and has now vaccinated most of the population of Victoria Falls with both doses.It seems the region is catching up, with "herd immunity" at the top of every marketing campaign.

At the ZCA we have been focused on gaining market exposure and in building numbers within the Alliance. In this update we give you some in-depth information on just three members of the twenty four that have joined the ZCA to date. Over time we aim to highlight you all.

Our list of strategic partners is growing too. These organisations are identified as working in fields that link in some way to the work many of you do. We believe that by bringing them into the team we can all benefit from their expertise. They can learn from you, and we can establish how best to package and provide solutions between us.

The ZCA has established itself as an Alliance, focused on, but not limited to, effective operations in areas adjacent to the big Parks. These areas are often those where communities live on the boundary and have to deal with the impact of human wildlife conflict each day. It is our belief that this is the front line for the future of natural habitat and the endemic species living there. Your work in creating both a firm relationship with the communities you work with and in preserving the intrinsic value of the bush, is so vital.

A priority of the ZCA is the need to tell the story on the global stage, because the message is very often lost in the plethora of information out there. There is a need to recognise that conservation work comes in many shapes and sizes and often involves hard decisions and other things that the softer wildlife enthusiast has become averse to. One of these areas of contention is consumptive tourism and the role being played through professionally managed and controlled offtake. Whilst we all want to see animals thrive, the reality is that until funding streams not linked to this business allow for sustainable income to preserve habitat across all terrain, consumptive tourism has a place at the table and while it does, we must support the absolute best and most ethical of them.

Conservation Calls

The Conservation Calls initiative is our newest project, linking a specialist conservationist to a group of people via a Zoom call. The talk is an hour long and focused on the conservationist's particular area of expertise. It is an interactive, educational discussion aimed at bringing to the forefront the reality of the situation in the region. Half the proceeds from the Conservation Calls goes to conservation, while the other half goes towards the Conservation Calls presenter. A Conservation Hero Passes Too Soon



We recognise the inspirational work of a conservation legend - Rory Young of Chengeta Wildlife who many of you knew.

Rory was leading a wildlife protection patrol in Arly National Park, Burkina Faso on 26th April 2021 when they were attacked by terrorists, which resulted in his death and that of two Spanish journalists who were capturing his efforts to protect precious wildlife.

Rory was the co-founder of Chengeta Wildlife, an extremely effective anti-poaching and conservation focused NGO that works in difficult spaces on the continent.

We had been in close discussion with Rory in recent times - he was helping us with some ideas on how best to structure and fund assistance to a particular Alliance partner in Mozambique. He gave freely of his valuable time and extensive knowledge and he was extremely interested in the group of partners that we are building across the region.

I feel privileged to have known Rory for many years, dating back to some enjoyable times in Kariba and canoeing on the lower Zambezi River. He was well liked and respected by many in the industry for his skills and leadership. His loss will be felt across the conservation world and especially so on the ground in Africa, in the extremely hard areas within which he dedicated his time.

I am sure you will all join us in sending deep respects and sympathy to his wife Marjet and their two children Astrid and Aiden. He will be remembered as a champion for nature.

This release we focus the spotlight on three partners who are working hard to establish a unique communitybased model, to offset the difficulties of human/wildlife conflict. The team at Isibaya have begun work on a wonderful scheme to develop a wildlife conservancy in a rural area of Western Matabeleland in Zimbabwe. The area has a high number of Leopard and the local community lose considerable livestock to these spotted predators. Of course, the Leopard are valuable, but not to the community. The Isibaya plan is to use modern farming techniques to develop a faster growing herd of cattle and goats that can be used as a bank to offset the losses. <u>Read more here</u>

The Niassa Reserve in Northern Mozambique is a fabled area for many of us nature lovers. The team at Luwire has embarked on a process to completely diversify their conservation model with a variety of new projects. With a population of 60,000 people and some of the most diverse ecosystems combined, in a part of Africa that is remote and harsh, we are astounded by their ability to turn their situation into one that is so positive and industrious. Clothing factories for export, commercial agriculture on an intensive scale and an international football event. <u>Read more here</u>

The South Luangwa in Eastern Zambia needs little introduction. The team at Nsefu has been working tirelessly in the areas adjacent to the Park to build resilience in the human/wildlife conflict. IWT UPDATE : NICK HOLME

The battle against IWT lost a leading light and champion when Rory Young, Co-Founder and CEO of Chengeta Wildlife, was murdered by terrorists in Burkina Faso on 26th April 2021. "Chengeta" is exactly what Rory and his team have been doing, looking after wildlife in some of the harshest terrains on earth and in the most difficult of circumstances.

In terms of the work ZCA is doing to combat IWT, we are making steady inroads into establishing a firm foundation from which to assist all of our Outreach Partners in the Zambesia region. One of our goals is to facilitate, where possible, the sharing of information and best practice, in order to increase the effectiveness of intelligence gathering at a regional level and to link our partners together in this crucial task. To that end we hope soon to be entering into an agreement with a strategic partner for the rolling out of appropriate technology to assist anti-poaching units in the region, with the aim of trying to ensure a standardised approach to information capture and the subsequent use of that information.

Furthermore, we are working closely with <u>The Royal Foundation's United for Wildlife</u> to form a Southern Africa chapter of its Financial and Transport Taskforces. The remit of these taskforces is to disrupt IWT as much as possible through the monitoring and prevention of criminal financing of IWT, as well as the transportation of illegal animal products. This is a work in progress and if anyone knows of a financial institution, or transport company in Southern Africa which they feel would be a useful member of these taskforces, then please let us know at nick@zambesia.com.

The third area of IWT where the ZCA is focusing its attention is on our **Ranger Alert Campaign** in partnership with the **Commonwealth Conservation Network** initiative of the Commonwealth Youth Orchestra. The primary aim behind this is to raise funds for the provision of life insurance for up to an initial 3,000 rangers in the Zambesia region and we would ask that you kindly let all of your contacts know about this, so that we can create global support for the campaign to help the men and women who are putting their lives at risk, on a daily basis, to protect our wildlife from the scourge of poaching.

As each of these initiatives progresses we will keep you updated and if anyone has thoughts or suggestions as to what more we can be doing in the fight against IWT then please feel free to contact us, as this needs to be a truly unified and collaborative effort by us all.
